• A new fund-raising program, announced by Jerry Siebert— the "Be a Lincoln Star" campaign aimed at increasing the LMCF Endowment Fund, which ensures the continued operations of our museum. (Complete details are included with this issue.)

• LMCF Treasurer Bruce

**Kopf** reported on the finances of the Foundation. That report appears in detail in this issue of *The Lincoln Link*.

• Joel Dickson will assume a new title: Vice President, Library and Archive Research. Fellow LMCF Trustee **Ray Theriault** will assume part of Joel's former duties; he will become Vice President, Automobile Registrar.

• Committee assignments for 2023 were announced. Any LMCF member is welcome to serve on any of the LMCF committees. Contact LMCF Chairman **David Schultz.** 

• **Paul Temple** stated that he will be preparing a list of nominees to be voted on at the August meeting. He emphasized that we are seeking trustees who will be actively engaged in the work of the Foundation. Anyone interested in becoming a trustee should contact Paul.

• Lincoln Owners Club President **Bill Wybenga** briefed the board on the upcoming 2023 Lincoln Homecoming, which is being hosted by the LOC. (Details are in this issue.)

• Jim Blanchard and Joel Dickson reported on museum and library activities. Their reports appear elsewhere in *The Lincoln Link*.

The board's next meeting will take place during the 2023 Lincoln Homecoming, which will be held on August 10–13 in Hickory Corners, Michigan. ■ Andrea Irby of Raleigh, North Carolina, the newest LMCF trustee, has also stepped into a top LMCF leadership role by agreeing to serve as the foundation's secretary. As such, she becomes a member of the LMCF executive committee and is already active on several other LMCF committees.

She has been interested in automobiles for much of her life. More on that later.

Andrea was born in North Carolina but was educated in Princeton, New Jersey, where her mother worked for Education Testing Service and later, Rutgers University. She earned a B.A. from the University of Virginia and an M.A. from American University.



## **Introducing Andrea Irby, New LMCF Trustee and Secretary**

She spent her career in higher education, working in student services, which included academic advising and admissions. Her employment at North Carolina State University proved providential. There, she oversaw the academic advising team for undergraduates in the university's College of Management—and met her future husband, **Cecil Bozarth,** who taught at that college.

At the time of their meeting, Cecil was restoring a Ford Mustang. When it was complete, he acquired a 1937 Lincoln-Zephyr three-window coupe, which was named "Rita." The restoration of the LincolnZephyr was completed and the car was displayed at the final Meadowbrook Concours d'Elegance in metro Detroit.

As Andrea says when describing their relationship, "Cars were a spark that led to a flame."

The next acquisition was a 1938 Lincoln K LeBaron convertible roadster, which was named "Happy Jack." By then, Andrea and Cecil had become active in the Lincoln-Zephyr Owners Club and the Lincoln Owners Club and the Lincoln Owners Club as well as the Antique Automobile Club of America, Tarheel Chapter and the Classic Car Club of America, Carolinas Region.

Just as the restoration of the

1938 Lincoln was imminent, Cecil died unexpectedly. Andrea maintained her activities with the automobile clubs and commissioned the restoration of the 1938 Lincoln with a member of the Lincoln Owners Club. The car was completed in the summer of 2022 and made its debut at the 2022 AACA Fall Meet in Hershey, Pennsylvania.

In addition to her car-related activities, Andrea is an accomplished equestrian who rides regularly. She is also involved in the restoration and economic revitalization of her hometown, Weldon, North Carolina, about 90 miles from Raleigh. She has two adult sons—James, an ornithologist, and Philip, a mathematician.

As the saying goes, "When you want to get something done, ask a busy person." The LMCF is pleased to have Andrea as a trustee and as its secretary.



A big *Thank You* to our recent donors:

• **Charlie Berry** is a faithful donor to the LMCF library and has recently donated a number of items ranging from a dealer invitation, owner's manuals, a data book, a product facts book, and a product portfolio, to a color and upholstery book and more. Dates range from 1924 to 2001.

• George Beyer has donated items from the literature collection of his father, Del. The LMCF is so grateful to be the recipient of such an important and varied collection. Items are from the 1920s into the 1960s. There are owner's manuals, reference books, data books, body parts catalogues, chassis parts catalogues, shop manuals, service bulletins, repair labor schedules, parts lists, service procedures, repair manuals, photographs, sales brochures, salon catalogs, and Lincoln ads-a great assortment of subjects on the Lincoln motor car!

• **Stephen Brauer** donated forty-six black-and-white Lincoln factory photos on a thumb drive



for the vehicle years 1934, 1935, and 1937.

• **Ruston Fannon** donated 1997 and 2004 Lincoln Town Car owner's manuals, and a 2012 MKZ owners manual with associated paperwork.

he museum is entering an exciting time as we process several newly donated vehicles—a 1941 Lincoln Continental Cabriolet, a 1926 Lincoln sevenpassenger sedan, and a 1942 Lincoln Continental Club Coupe. Some of these are duplications, which will require storage. Perhaps we will integrate some of them in our 2023 Lincoln Homecoming. In any event, they represent a strengthening of your Lincoln museum, and we are grateful for these generous donations.

We are particularly excited to receive the 1931 Lincoln sport phaeton donation from **David Rehor.** Many of you viewed it at last summer's Homecoming. It returned to its restorer for some final spiff and perfection, and we look forward viewing its excep-



tional workmanship on the museum floor.

Also on display is the oneoff 1929 Lincoln Aero Phaeton designed and built by LeBaron for the 1929 Automobile Salons. The car is on loan to us by its current owner, **Stan Lucas**, also one of our solid financial supporters. The car will be on display through the 2023 Homecoming—possibly longer.

Joel Dickson is working very

diligently to get our research library online with digitized content. We are excited to begin enjoying this initiative of your Foundation.

## **Lincoln Motor Car Foundation Treasurer's Report**

incoln Motor Car Foundation's 2022 full year D performance vs. budget was a net gain of \$24,014, which was \$18,064 better than budget. Annual and Annual Sustaining memberships were below budget, offset by Life and Memorial Memberships better than budget, for a combined total of \$308 better than budget. August Homecoming, celebrating 100 years of the Lincoln automobile, was very successful, netting \$23,623, which was \$3,623 better than budget. The rest of the \$18,064 performance was more than explained by better than expected interest rates.

When the 2022 IRS Form 990 is filed, the Michigan Attorney General will require the Foundation to have a CPA Review of the financial records conducted. This is due to the total contributions of \$382,000, including Endowment and Vehicle donations, being over the \$275,000 MI threshold.

Endowment Fund paid dona-

tions now total \$1,631,550, or \$1,641,050 including \$9,500 of pledges due. The Endowment Fund objective was increased two years ago by the Board of Trustees to \$2.0 million, which is needed to ensure sustainable operation and maintenance of the Museum for the future.

The prior 12 months' Endowment Fund income has now reached almost \$52,000, which is about 81% of the \$63,650 expense budgeted in 2023 for operation and maintenance of the Museum. The remainder of the revenue needed is provided by the August Homecoming, the sale of merchandise and contributions to the Ongoing Maintenance Fund and the Fabulous Fifty Fund.

## **Bob Anderson Dies; Restored '39 Continental #2**

t is with profound sadness that the family of **Robert J. Anderson, Sr.,** announces his peaceful passing on April 14, 2023, in Clearwater, Florida. Bob was a founding lifetime member of the Lincoln Motor Car Foundation as well as a retired long-time LMCF trustee.

He was born in 1934 in Montclair, New Jersey, and moved to Houtzdale, Pennsylvania, in the late 1940s. He was the owner of Anderson's Department Store until its closing in the 1980s. Bob and his wife, Pat, continued on with Anderson's Cap Creations at automobile flea markets throughout the United States until 2016.

Bob was an avid car collector and restorer, beginning in 1967. He owned numerous show cars and sold parts throughout the years. He enjoyed Fords, Lincolns and Chevrolets. His pride was the restoration of the second 1939 Lincoln-Zephyr Continental Cabriolet prototype, which is now owned by the Edsel and Eleanor Ford House in Grosse Pointe Shores, Michigan.

The milestone Continental was discovered in the 1960s by Jesse Haines, but it was Bob who finally restored it forty years later. Continental #1, Edsel Ford's vacation car, was scrapped.

Bob was a member of numerous car clubs for over 60 years, including the LCOC, LZOC, AACA, CCCA, NWC and STCA.

He will be lovingly remembered by his wife of over 69 years, Pat, and his three children: Nanette Anderson of Safety Harbor, Florida; Robert Jr. (Lori) of Houtzdale, Pennsylvania; and Todd Anderson of Safety Harbor, Florida.

■ After the Amelia Island Concours, Bob Anderson took the '39 Continental prototype down to St. Augustine, Florida, to show it to the man who designed it—former Ford stylist Bob Gregorie. Gregorie had actually owned the car for a while in the early 1940s.






